Bob's Tech Corner

This month tech tip will be more of a blog than a bonified tech tip so hang on and enjoy the ride.

For the past two months I have been busy with my 68, 140 Monza. It all started with my noticing that it was not running as well as usual. I also started noticing a bit of black soot in my tail pipes.

I then started with a compression check and found nothing that stood out as unusual. However, when looking at the spark plugs to do the compression check, EVERY plug was black with burnt oil!

I purchased a mini cam so I could look inside the spark plug hole into the engine hoping to see something definitive. NO such luckat first. I did not want to remove the Power Pack so I did everything while the engine was in the car. NOT fun!

When turning the engine over while holding the camera in the spark plug hole, which was quite a feat, I watched the valves lift off their seats and return. So far so good. On #5 of course the last one I looked at; I did not see the intake valve move AT ALL throughout the four-stroke cycle of the piston in that cylinder! Eureka a stuck valve or so I thought.

Removing the heads, provided me a glimpse into the PO's build. The pistons were TRW long skirt forged and the heads had been refurbished many years ago by someone that knew what they were doing, as the valve springs were set at the correct height and the guides were Bronze on the intakes. Herein I found part of my problem. The bronze guides were of the firs gen type so not as robust as the ones we get today. They were passing oil into the combustion chambers and are worn out! The combustion chambers are all coked up with the burning of the oil passed by the worn valve guides. Not a pretty site. Luckily, I have some heads that have been refurbished already by an unknown machine shop in the distant past, but they will have to do for now. I have already de-flashed them, so at least I know that has been done.

I have opened a can of worms and decided to remove the Turkey roster engine cover and fix any leaks that I find, and there were plenty. THE top cover with the bearing was in need of resealing, leaking at both ends, and I couldn't fix the leaks, without looking at the rods and piston rings. Examining the rods, still attached to the crankshaft, I see that the Crank and the rods have been balanced. SWEET...

Removing the rods and cylinders, I will eventually hone the cylinders to break the glaze and re-ringed the pistons with Grant, Moly, .030 over rings. Well, since I already had standard rod bearings, I decided to use them. So the rods have new bearings and the pistons have new Moly rings! In honing out the cylinders, I found one cylinder that was not up to my specs, and I just so happened to have a .030 cylinder in my collection and used it. No taper and very usable.

As usual, I sized all the rings to the cylinders to get the best fit and be within specs. After getting all pistons rings on and then back in the cylinders, It was time to install them in their proper places. Everything went as planed and torqued to 25 ft lbs. The Top bearing cover was installed and Clark's serrated, Anti shake bolts were used. I also replaced the OIL Cooler seals while I was that close. Good thing I did because they were the OLD neoprene type that had become hard and were leaking! VITON to the rescue! The pushrod tubes had Viton seals, but they were pretty old and the rocker studs were Viton as well. However, one side had two seals that had split under the pushrod guides! Another leak found and repaired! The lifters were replaced with original Corvair lifters that had been rebuilt and surfaced ground with the correct conical face, by Wilhoite Cams in OKC. The PO had installed Chevy V8 lifters, and they were part of my problems.

After the engine was all back together, It was time to start it. Of course, I had already set the initial valve adjustment "cold".

I ran it per the Corvair gurus, to break in the lifters to the used cam and seat the rings.

Under the car I had a small oil leak that I traced to one PR tube on #6. I had watched it for 30 min and thought that the new oil pan gasket was leaking. NOT SO.. The leak was from a push rod tube that appeared to be cracked. Removing that cylinder's rockers guide plate and knocking out the offending PR tube I found NOT a cracked push rod tube, but I had failed to install a seal on the block side! Being tired or being in a hurry cost me more time and aggravation! I got that repaired very quickly and decided that on the morrow I would cut a valve cover to run the valves "hot" like the big boys!

I did not cut a valve cover, instead I cut holes in a valve cover to better keep the oil from spitting all over the floor and on me!

After the running valve adjustment, I found that all the oil leaks had been found and eliminated.


The carbs are another story, for another time. Suffice it to say that all is well and my 68 is running almost like it should! Some light tinkering with the carb settings should have it Humming down the road.


